### Celtic Christian Fasts

"Strive to enter by the narrow gate; for many, I say to you, shall seek to enter, and shall not be able." Luke 13:24

There are four major Fasts:  
40 days following the Epiphany;  
40 days before Easter;  
40 days before Christmas;  
40 days after Pentecost.

There are Fasts on the Vigils of Major Feasts and on Feasts such as those of the Beheading of Saint John the Baptist and those of the Holy Cross. For convenience, entries for Fast Seasons and Feasts observed with a Fast are shown indented.

There is a Fast on the Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays of all weeks.

The Monday Fast is optional to all except Céili Dé. It is still strongly recommended.

On Fast Days:

All should abstain from all animal products and alcoholic drinks, except in the Eucharist. Note that fasting should be a matter of what one is able to do: "A man however who disciplines himself severely, and whom sickness or disease distresses through his abstinence, must impose upon himself only a little additional, like a child." (Rule V. A. ) Medical need excuses one from fasting.

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Those in a Community Fast by limiting food to one meal, that of the evening.  
All must abstain from all animal products and alcoholic drinks at evening meals of all Saturdays and any evening before a Liturgy.  
There is a complete fast of all food and water from Midnight before the Mass.

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
